

Former KU prof Monday, July 31, 1989 dies at age 82

Henry A. Shenk, who was a Kansas University faculty member for more than three decades, died Saturday morning at the age of 82, while vacationing in Nederland, Colo.

Shenk and his wife, Katherine, lived in Lawrence, but traveled to a mountain cabin in Colorado every summer where they pitched horseshoes and fished for trout, according to their son, Bob Shenk.

Shenk, who had served for 16 years on the Lawrence School Board, was professor emeritus of health, physical education and recreation at KU and chairman of the department for 27 years. He retired in 1976 after 48 years of teaching and coaching in Kansas.

ACCORDING TO Olin Petefish, a local attorney and Shenk's friend for 40 years, "Henry Shenk was one of the finest gentlemen that has been at the university and a





Paul Endacott (with Lucille standing beside him) celebrating his 93rd birthday. 7-13-95







RAYMOND NICHOLS

Memorial services for Raymond Francis Nichols, 95, Lawrence, will be at 11 a.m. Friday at Plymouth Congregational Church. Private inurnment will take place in Pioneer Cemetery.

Mr. Nichols died Tuesday, Oct. 12, 1999, at Lawrence Presbyter-

ian Manor.

He was born Dec. 30, 1903, in Larned, the son of Charles A. and Etta Jane (Cook) Nichols. He earned bachelor's and master's degrees from Kansas University, where he was Phi Beta Kappa.

Mr. Nichols was a journalist before serving as executive secretary to the university, vice chancellor for finance and chancellor at KU. He was instrumental in developing the KU Alumni Center and the KU Space Technology Center, which is named after him.

He received the Distinguished Service Award and the Ellsworth Medallion, KU's highest accolades, and was named a chancellor emeritus of KU.

Other awards included: Lawrence Citizen of the Year; Paul Harris Fellowship from Rotary October 15, 1999

Ray Nichols dies at 95

Chancellor emeritus retired in 1973 after 44 years of service to KU

U's 12th chancellor, Raymond F. Nichols, died at age 95 on Oct. 12 at Presbyterian Manor. Nichols served as chancellor from 1972 to 1973. Raymond Nichols Hall, KU's Space Technology

Center, was named for Nichols in recognition of his promotion of significant research, educational and service activities at KU.

Nichols, who worked for 44 years at KU, retired in 1973.

"Raymond Nichols' involvement with the University of Kansas spanned more than 70 years," Chancellor Robert Hemenway said. "No one cared more about KU than he did.
