Written and directed by Francois Truffaut, *The 400 Blows* (1959) is one of the ground-breaking films which heralded the nouvelle vague movement in French cinema. It is Truffaut's autobiographical story, recast as the 14-year-old Antoine Doinel, who is constantly in trouble both at school and at home. When his parents finally decide to send him to a juvenile detention facility, Antoine manages to break out of the vicious circle that has been his life, and there is suddenly some joy and promise of hope. The title *The 400 Blows* comes from the French idiom "faire les quatre cents coups," meaning "to raise hell." Bosley Crowther writes in The New York Times: "Francois Truffaut at age 27 has turned out a picture that might be termed a small masterpiece." (In French, with English subtitles, 100 minutes.)

Although it is set at the time of the First Crusade, director Robert Carsen cleverly transforms the setting to a modern-day classroom where the students, bored with history, begin to act out the events of the story in the classroom and the playgrounds around the school. They imagine themselves as brave Crusaders fighting the "infidels," seen now as their history teacher, a rubber-suited dominatrix who is having an illicit love affair with the lascivious principal of the school. Conductor Ottavio Dantone guides a youthful cast of today's luminaries in the dramatic art of Baroque opera.

Bird whistles reminiscent of innocent bygone days will be distributed free to the audience, so we can all participate musically in one of the scenes in the opera. Although Rinaldo is 3 hours and 10 minutes long, the time flies by swiftly, just like our memories of childhood itself. (Sung in Italian, with English subtitles.)
