September 26—1:30 in the Summerfield Room. Of all Ingmar Bergman's films, *Fanny and Alexander* (1982) is probably the most beloved. Mostly autobiographical in nature, the film is about what happens to Fanny and Alexander in their joyously theatrical household when their father dies unexpectedly, and their mother surprises everyone by marrying the stentorian town's bishop and moves into his austere household. The children are frightened and miserable, especially after the bishop severely beats Alexander for telling a lie, and the rest of this wondrous film shows how the two children escape when they are befriended by a local Jewish antique dealer and puppet maker who also turns out to be their grandmother's lover.

Fanny and Alexander won four Academy Awards—for Best Cinematography, Best Art Direction, Best Costume Design, and Best Foreign Language Film. (In Swedish, with English subtitles.) There is a longer five-hour version of this film, but we are showing the shorter version, the one which won all the Academy Awards, which clocks in at only 3 hours and 8 minutes. It's absolutely gorgeous, every minute of it. Swedish meatballs and the usual light refreshments at 1:15, film at 1:30.
