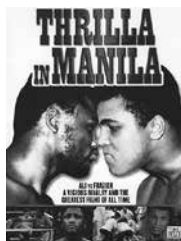

It’s Black History Month, and we are showing a documentary revealing the vicious rivalry between Muhammad Ali and Joe Frazier in *Thrilla in Manila*, which unfolded in the searing heat of the Philippines in 1975, now considered “the greatest fight of all time.” Ang Lee is currently filming a new feature film based on the fight, with actors portraying Ali and Frazier, but why wait when you can see the real thing as it happened? 2008, 85 minutes. After the program, DVDs of *When We Were Kings*, the earlier 1974 documentary of the heavyweight championship in Zaire between George Foreman and Muhammad Ali, sometimes called *The Rumble in the Jungle*, will be given free to boxing aficionados.

Thanks to Martin Scorsese, who has been a longtime champion of Filipino filmmaker Lino Brocka, Criterion has now released a pristine Blu-ray edition of Brocka’s 1975 masterpiece, *Manila in the Claws of Light*, which follows a provincial young man as he searches for his girlfriend, who has been lured to the Big City as a domestic helper but who seems to have ended up entrapped as a sex slave in Manila’s seamy Chinatown. “To watch *Manila in the Claws of Light*,” wrote one critic, “is to be burned by a flame that never goes out.” *In Tagalog with English subtitles*, 126 minutes. 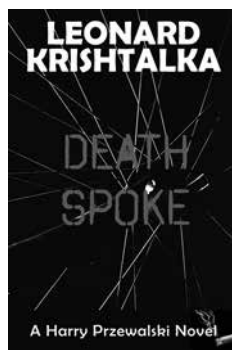

Leonard “Kris” Krishtalka, Director of KU’s Natural History Museum, and novelist, will talk about his new mystery, *Death Spoke*, as well as provide an update on replacing the museum’s iconic grotesques. His latest novel is the second featuring Private Investigator Harry Przewalski. It involves the murder of a fictional KU dean, who was renowned as an archaeologist and expert on prehistoric cave paintings in France. The prime suspect, her lover, chairs the anthropology department, and hires Harry



Przewalski to prove his innocence. Przewalski learns that the dean not only had a double life, but also that her murder was a diabolical act of revenge for a horrific atrocity committed during WWII in Nazi-occupied France.
