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President's Report David Mannering

The 2019-2020 year started out normally for the Endacott Society, but in March we moved from meeting in the KU Alumni Center into cyberspace as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic. As this report is being drafted we are still meeting via Zoom, and we expect to continue Zooming through the summer. This has been challenging for our members who thrive on social interaction and especially so for those who do not have the technology to meet virtually.

The story of our year is contained in the individual reports below, but I will highlight four items:

Our new web site, endacottsociety.org, went live in the early fall. It was basically a year in the making, and it resulted in a completely redesigned site while keeping nearly all of the previous content. The biggest improvement was the addition of a dynamic calendar which facilitates both long-range scheduling and last-minute updates. More details can be found in the Technology Support section below.

In response to reports of difficulties in finding speakers for monthly programs the Afternoon Lecture, Public Affairs and Armchair Travel activities were combined into the Endacott Speaker Series, with each topic only needing to put together a quarterly program. This also resulted in moving the monthly birthday celebration to the third Wednesday Coffee each month. This change has produced mixed success, as we now have a speaker backlog in some areas.

As the pandemic forced changes in the work environment we were informed that the KU Alumni Association could not continue to print and mail our monthly newsletters to our membership. This resulted in significant

changes to both the format and the circulation which are detailed in the Newsletter section below.

Lastly, as I mentioned above, we learned how to meet virtually via the Zoom teleconferencing software in order to keep a few regular Endacott Society activities going through the spring, and now continuing through the summer. Kudos to the activity leaders who braved this new technology and adapted their programs to it.

Before releasing you to dig into the many Endacott Society accomplishments documented below, I want to give a shoutout my fellow Officers:

Gene Pucket is retiring as Treasurer, a crucial position that he volunteered for when our need was great. He's learned a lot this year, both about Endacott Society budgets and about the perils of volunteering.

David Bushouse has continued on as Secretary but took on an expanded role this year by recording the special topics presented in our Wednesday Coffees and in assembling this Annual Report.

President Elect Jo Cink took on several special projects this year (detailed below), and is well prepared to receive the leadership baton at the end of this month.

Paul Stephen Lim was Past President this year and thus will be replaced in that position by yours truly. Paul has truly done a yeoman's work in his three years as an officer.

The Officers group met several times during the year to discuss our strategy in coping with the changes forced upon us. They have been great teammates. - Dave Mannering

Membership Report

- 1. Membership as of May 21, 2020 was 494. On April 28, 2019, the membership was 479. This is a net gain of 15 members. Snapshots, however, are sometimes difficult to compare since annual memberships come due throughout the year for individuals. In March the pandemic caused the KUAA staff to work from home. The result was that membership renewals that came via postal mail were not able to be processed in a timely manner.
- 2. I obtained lists of retired faculty and staff from July 2018 thru June 2019. The list totaled 154 retirees. At last review, twenty one (21) retirees from this group joined the Endacott Society.
 - a. Worked with the Alumni Association to cross check the retiree names for current Alumni Association membership and secondary crosscheck for Endacott Society membership.
 - b. Goals:

Those who are already Alumni Association members but not an Endacott Member will be encouraged to become active in Endacott.

Remaining retirees will be encouraged to join Alumni Association and become active in the Endacott Society, most likely at the reduced rate offered.

- 3. Recruitment of the 2018-19 retirees:
 - a. In September 2019, a letter from the Endacott Society (on KU Alumni Association letterhead) was sent to retirees who are current alumni members who are not active in Endacott. A similar letter was sent to those who are not current alumni members. Both explained our activities and included an Endacott Society brochure. Updated in 2018, this brochure also contains an application for membership.
 - b. Specifically designed invitation for them to be guests at the upcoming October 31 evening lecture and dinner. This was Halloween, and a special 'Save the Date' postcard was also mailed prior to the September letter.
 - c. The monthly newsletter (included month schedule of events) was sent to all new retirees for three months (September thru November).
 - d. Evaluate success of the process.

Those new retirees who attended (3 with guests) received special recognition at the dinner. Two (2) of the three joined Endacott. Several other new retirees indicated they would like to attend the next dinner. We continued to recruit them but understood that the response might not be high.

A future consideration: Consider re-contacting those who have been retired one year or longer to inquire about their interest in joining Endacott.

- 4. Recruitment of the 2019-20 retirees.
 - a. I will request lists of the 2019-20 retirees and will contact them late summer.
- 5. Membership recruitment is an ongoing project. Working with Tegan Thornberry and Stephanie Shackelford of the KU Alumni Association is delightful. They are extremely helpful in our recruitment process. Tegan has taken another job and I will work with Merideth Warriner on membership recruitment this summer.

President-Elect Report

I represented the Endacott Society at the first meeting of the University Senate Retiree Rights and Benefits Committee on October 9, 2019. We discussed housing options for KU retirees and those at peer institutions and asked to check into what other universities provided in the way of on campus housing. We met again in November and divided up responsibilities for checking over the current retiree handbook sections to see what new changes had been implemented, if any, for this year's revision. We had a follow-up meeting in January, but the final revisions were planned for the March meeting, which was cancelled because the campus was shut down by the pandemic.

Special Events

At the October 2, 2019, Wednesday coffee, a KU Safety Officer gave a presentation on the use of the defibrillator that is kept in the hall on second floor of the Alumni Center. This was done to make Endacott members less fearful of this piece of emergency equipment, and the talk was well received by those in attendance that morning. The demonstration was followed by a question and answer session.

The Alumni Association requested that someone from the Endacott Society gather first impressions of the KU campus from our members. It was hoped that their remembrances could be used in an article or ad for the Alumni Association. I started gathering this information via newsletter requests and Wednesday coffee interviews. I concluded this project in January and the results were published in the newsletter and forwarded to the Alumni Association.

In March we collected 10 pounds of frozen hamburger for the Camus Cupboard at the KU Union. This student program is supported by Just Food and other donors to supplement the diets of needy KU students. I hope we can support them in some way when we are able to gather together again in the Alumni Center.

I sent out a request for memories from our members about campus life during the time of the "troubles" and Union fire on campus around April 20, 1970. I also requested members reactions to the current stay-at-home policy due to the current Covid-19 pandemic. This could appear in upcoming newsletter and be placed in the time capsule in the new addition to the Alumni Center.

When I took over responsibility for the library in the summer of 2019, I set two tasks for myself, one short- and the other long-range.

- (1) I created and labeled a "Recent Acquisitions" shelf in a clearly visible and accessible section at eye level to house the large number of books donated to the library over previous months. I also created a signup sheet for checking out and returning books. At the end of 2019 I set aside a second shelf to handle the overflow.
- (2) I made a beginning on my longer-term project of reorganizing the library, culling out duplicate copies of books and putting them in the freestanding cabinet, with paperbacks available to members for the taking. I hope eventually to tidy up the collection by categories and even alphabetize the books. I sorted the periodicals we receive on a weekly basis. Paul Lim passed along his copies of the Sunday New York Times to make available each week until January, at which point I took over the responsibility.

Between the pandemic closing of the library and Alumni Association plans to renovate the Adams Center, I am concerned at this point about securing and housing the library in the future.

Arts and Sciences Afternoon Lectures

An Afternoon Lecture Series was introduced that included Public Affairs, Armchair Travel and what had been the Afternoon Lecture program, renamed to Arts and Sciences Lectures. The series would include 12 lectures, four for each of the program groups.

- When possible, the one-hour lectures would be on the second Thursday of each month, rotating among the three program groups. The birthday recognition program was moved to the third Wednesday of each month as part of the 10 a.m. Coffee Hour.
- Arts and Sciences lectures were scheduled July 11, Nov. 14, Feb. 27 and May 14. This spring we had added a fifth lecture on April 30. Three of the five were presented before March 12 when the Alumni Center closed due to quarantine efforts to contain the Covid-19 pandemic. Attendance for Arts & Sciences programs varied from 25 to 35.
- July 11 Bernie Kish, lecturer in KU's School of Education, and Carole Cadue-Blackwood, Lawrence social worker, talked about their efforts to recognize Billy Mills, Oglala Lakota tribe member, 1964 Olympic gold medalist and military veteran. An alumnus of both the Haskell Indian Nations University and KU, Mills is known for his humanitarian work in community building, especially with Native American youth. Kish encouraged KU to present Mills with an honorary doctorate in the 2019 commencement program. Cadue-Blackwood led efforts to name a Lawrence middle school for Mills.
- **November 14** Anne Patterson, lecturer in KU's School of Architecture, whose teaching skills have received national and local recognition, spoke about "How Drawing Helps You See Anew." Some architecture alumni who have visited her studio have confided that they would return to KU just to take Patterson's beginning design class.
- **February 27** Leonard "Kris" Krishtalka, director of KU's Biodiversity Center, updated us on the progress to replace Dyche Hall's iconic grotesques and talked about the intrigues of his latest novel, *Death Spoke*. This is the second in Krishtalka's series of three Harry Przewalski mysteries. His first was *The Bone Field* and the third, *The Camel Driver*, was to be released this year. The Kansas Union bookstore had a sales table at the lecture. NOTE: this lecture originally scheduled on Feb. 13 was postponed due to bad weather.
- We hope to reschedule talks planned for April 30 and for May 14. Those programs would have been a discussion of immigration and diversity in Kansas communities with Don Stull, professor emeritus in anthropology, and Steve Lerner, Topeka filmmaker. The discussion would include screening Lerner's documentary, *Strangers in Town*, about Garden City, Kansas. We had also scheduled Chuck Warner, retired KU alumnus, to talk about the memoir he has written about his grandfather: *Birds, Bones and Beetles: The Improbable Career and Remarkable Legacy of Charles D. Bunker*. Warner's grandfather was a taxidermist with an eighth-grade education who became curator of birds and mammals with the KU Natural History Museum when it was directed by Lewis Lindsay Dyche.

Public Affairs Forum

PAF aims to bring in speakers to address topics on local, national and international civic affairs. Topics of current public interest are especially sought after. Historical topics are also considered if they bear importantly on current events. PAF generally meets in the Adams Alumni Center at 1:30 p.m. on the second Thursday of the third month of each quarter. Light refreshments are available 15 minutes before the 1:30 program. Speakers generally hold forth for 45 minutes, followed by 15 minutes or so of questions and discussion. Attendance varied over this period from a high of 35 to a low of 26.

Noteworthy during this period was the shift of PAF from occurring once a month to occurring once per quarter, as part of the new Endacott unified speakers series. Also, PAF was suspended because of Covid-19 medical challenges, along with all other

Endacott in-person activities, beginning March 2020. Therefore the PAF events that would normally have been scheduled for March 2020 and June 2020 did not take place.

Public Affairs Forum sessions this year were as follows:

September 9, 2019 Speaker Linda Kuang, of the Kansas City Falun Gong support organization, on the subject of the persecution of Falun Gong, a human rights crisis in China. 35 persons present plus the speaker.

October 14, 2019 Speaker Boog Highberger, Lawrence representative to the Kansas State Legislature, on the subject of current Kansas state legislative politics. 26 persons present plus the speaker.

Drama Study could not wait to begin the 2019-2020 year. By July, the seven plays to be read for Fall semester had been decided, and for Spring, the same number were compiled by the end of November. Two of the listed plays, *As You Like It* and Paula Vogel's *Indecent* were from the KU Theatre production season, and included in planned trips to see actual theatre productions Everything went smoothly, and we saw *As You Like It* in February, but then COVID-19

happened during Spring Break and the Endacott Society entered a new, uncharted territory. Thank goodness for our excellent leadership team; the Endacott was soon hooked on Zoom. By the first week of April, Drama Study had its first virtual meeting on Zoom, and carried on with scheduled programs while making a few adjustments including the following:

Virtual play reading on Zoom creates time lapses and voice distortions, consequently, play reading during meetings was suspended. Plays must be read in advance, and our Zoom meetings were exclusively for discussions, or video viewing.

As part of efforts to counter the effects of COVID-19 lockdown, and encourage positive energy, the earlier Spring reading list was set aside for more lively, and uplifting plays.

Trips to theatre for play productions were canceled,

Regular attendance dwindled from an average of 13 to 7 attendees; Zoom is good, but not the same as physical interaction.

However, since members meet only to discuss plays, the number of plays read in Spring almost doubled the original list.

Overall, the Drama Study group implemented the changes initiated last year with encouraging results. COVID-19 notwithstanding, we continued meeting twice a month -1^{st} & 3^{rd} Tuesdays, enabling us to read more plays and have more in depth discussions. As reflected in the list of plays below, our expanded reading ranged from classical to contemporary plays across different cultures, and includes female playwrights. Most of the plays were from *The Stages of Drama*, anthology of plays (thanks Paul Lim and the late Bob Procter) but we also choose plays from other sources, especially from KU Theatre & Dance Department seasonal offerings. Members volunteered to facilitate discussions, and we found the richness of the diversity stimulating and delightfully challenging. As usual, Paul Lim enriched our play reading experience with his recordings of stage performances. Altogether, Drama Study read a total of seventeen plays during the 2019/2020 academic year.

Garden Seminar

The Garden Seminar of the Endacott Society met on a regular schedule nearly every Wednesday morning from 9:00am to 10:00am during the past year, just prior to the regularly scheduled meeting of the Wednesday morning Ten O'clock Scholars coffee. This changed however, when health concerns about Covid-19 virus caused the closure of activities in the Adams Alumni Center when the KU campus was closed in March 2020. We then switched over to Zoom meetings from 8:30 to 9:30am Wednesday mornings each week.

Emphasis continues to be on discussions of gardening topics provided weekly by the Kansas State University Extension Service's Horticultural Newsletter. We used You Tube videos and KState Extension videos for discussions. We always find time to talk about interesting natural history observations that the members had and try to answer their questions. There is a show and tell event at the beginning of a meeting where a flower, leaf or twig is passed around for identification. Plant cuttings are often exchanged among members.

Several members gave presentations to the group during the year including Stan Roth who talked about ecology of Kansas bats, Jon Standing who gave two talks on Joshua trees and Sequoias in California, and Cal Cink who showed photographs of the plants in Weeks Bay Pitcher Plant Bog in Alabama.

We introduced the idea of a talk about botanical gardens each month but only worked in two of them, one on the Asticou Azelea Garden in Mt. Desert Island, Maine and one on the

Phipps Conservatory and Botanical Garden in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania. Hopefully we can have a few more next year as these presentations were enjoyed by all.

Members had one very enjoyable, early morning field trip this year on September 25th to Susan Rendall's home garden just north of Lawrence. She had a marvelous variety of flowers, shrubs and trees to show us and provided interesting commentary on how she has developed the garden over the years.

Garden Seminar brought back Douglas County horticultural extension agent, Tom Buller, to visit with us in November and we had a lively discussion about his current projects and he fielded questions on a variety of topics. Tom agreed to continue his annual visits to our group next year.

One special project of the group was organizing a memorial to Allen Wiechert, who served as chair of the Garden Seminar for a number of years and was President of the Endacott Society. With the approval of his wife Sandra on planting a tree in his honor, we solicited funds from the

membership and explored options of tree type and location of the planting. Susan and Doug Rendall consulted with Director Derek Kwan about planting two trees outside the Lied Center and placing a bench with plaque between them. The trees were planted on May 2nd and the bench will be installed later in May.

Mid-Morning Meditation

- September 27 *The King's Singers: From Byrd to the Beatles*, a prelude to the King's Singers planned appearance at the Lied Center in October

Old Time Radio Shows

Our listening group meets for two hours once a month to learn about, listen to, and discuss Old Time Radio shows. No preparation is required of attendees except to show up and enjoy. The shows from the '30, '40s, and '50s, and their associated commercials, elicit lively discussion both about the shows and related aspects of life then, such as the roles of homemakers and the nature of advertising.

Like other Endacott groups, the 2019-2020 year had some ups and downs. Our attendance ranged from 16 to 6, averaging about 10. On the recent Zoom meetings in April and May 2020, the attendance has been higher at 15.

We do not meet in December, and March events were canceled. We were back up in April with Zoom, and will continue to do so until in-person meetings possibly resume. The Zoom format has been working well for this group. Aside from a technical glitch at the beginning of the first program, they have run exceptionally smoothly. The only thing missing with Zoom is sharing snacks from recipes based on foods popular in that era.

In July, our theme was **Hard-Boiled Detectives.** We listened to episodes of *Pat Novak, Sam Spade, and Richard Diamond.*

In August, the theme was **Variety Shows**. They were a combination of traditional variety shows, and shows that were mostly comedy. We heard *Jack Benny, Gene Autry*, and the pilot episode for *Danny Kaye*'s long-running program.

September brought **Hard-Boiled Detectives** again but the time featuring **Women Private Eyes.** Although there were not many women detectives on the air during radio's Golden Age, we managed to find several that showcased their variety. We played a *Phyl Coe* episode (a play on the name of the sponsor, Philco Radio Tubes). It required listeners to tune in the following week to hear the solution to the crime. In our discussion, however, we were able to use the clues presented to correctly solve it. We also listened to an episode of *Miss Pinkerton, Inc.*, and a *Candy Matson* show from 1949.

Halloween was the theme for October. We listened to three of the scariest stories available. First was a *Quiet Please*, "The Thing on the Fourble Board." Then a newlywed couple meets a monster in their closet in *Suspense*'s interpretation of "The House in Cypress Canyon". The final scary program was a *Lights Out* from 1948 titled "The Revolt of the Worms." In the middle of the frightening stories, we took a lighter fare break with *Baby Snooks* trick-or-treating on Halloween.

In November, it was time to look at the **Holidays**. We listened to an episode of *The*

Six Shooter with James Stewart, which had a direct interpretation to the story of Scrooge. We listened to Christmas Music from 1946 with Jill's All-Time Jukebox, and learned about Thanksgiving, courtesy of The Answer Man. We finished up with Jack Benny's Christmas Show from 1954.

December called for our annual break, so we could spend it with loved ones.

In January, the theme was **Soap Operas**. Since most soaps are only 15 minutes, we were able to sample several of them. Among others, we listened to *Just Plain Bill, Stella Dallas, The Romance of Helen Trent, and Ma Perkins*.

February was our final in-person meeting, although we didn't know it at the time. The theme was **Science Fiction**, and we listened to stories by Robert Heinlein and Ray Bradbury in *X Minus One* and *Dimension X* episodes, as well as a *Mysterious Traveler* story from 1950. We even made time for the pilot episode of *Buck Rogers* from 1939.

In March, we were not able to meet, since the Center was closed, and I hadn't figured out Zoom yet. We had planned the theme of **March Madness**, but it seemed appropriate to cancel the madness and insanity episodes that were scheduled.

April brought about our first Zoom conference call. The theme was **Comedy** again, as levity seemed much needed during lock-down. We started a episode, and had a technical issue. We listened to episodes of *Jack Benny, Father Knows Best*, and *George Burns and Gracie Allen*. We had suggestions from the group for future programming.

The May meeting was a mix of **Lighter Fare** and **World War II-Newscasts.** We heard an episode of *Jack Benny* that was voted in Old Time Radio Collectors' groups online as one of the best. *The Life of Riley* was also a popular episode. A newscast from H. V. Kaltenborn about the complexity of ending World War II in Europe, and a broadcast by Lowell Thomas from the same time frame

allowed us to commemorate the 75th anniversary of the War's end, as well to do a nice comparison between the very different styles of the two broadcasters.

Our June meeting will be another Zoom meeting on June 29th from 1:30 to 3:30. It John R. Nicholson

will be a true **Potpourri**, as we will listen to *Gunsmoke*, *The Shadow*, and *Fibber McGee & Molly*.

We will continue to meet via Zoom over the summer, at least. I hope you will join us.

When Allen Wiechert died unexpectedly on October 29, 2019, I suggested to the Endacott Society's Garden Seminar group (of which Allen was a longtime member) that we raise funds to plant a tree for Allen somewhere on the KU campus. Because Allen had been the University Architect of KU, and because he had also been instrumental in the building of the Lied Center, I asked Derek Kwan if it would be appropriate to plant a tree on the grounds of the Lied Center in Allen's memory. Derek was enthusiastic about the project, so I spearheaded the fund-raising among members of the Endacott Society, with Endacott Treasurer Gene Puckett in charge of the funds collected. After less than a month, we collected \$2,030, enough not just for one tree, but two trees, plus a bronze bench. With input from Sandra Wiechert, the project was turned over to Susan and Doug Rendall, who selected the two trees ("Rising Sun" Redbuds) and planted them in late April right by one of the main entrances to the Lied Center, with Sandra in attendance. The bench arrives later, and there will be a more formal ceremony at that time.

Technology Support

The new web site was unveiled this year, and because of the dynamic calendar feature it requires considerably more maintenance than the old site did. However, the WordPress software makes changes to the site relatively easy to do. Part of the changeover to the new site involved us acquiring the endacottsociety.org domain name.

Most of the content from the old site was preserved on the new site, just in a different format; however the Oral Histories transcripts have been removed, since they were redundant with those kept at the Spencer Research Library. We did keep a searchable index of the transcripts that are on site at the Alumni Center.

The Gmail account was relatively idle for the first part of the year since we had moved the newsletter submissions to the newsletter editor's e-mail account. The Gmail account became active again in association with our new Zoom account, as we use the Gmail contact list to manage the subscriptions to the Endacott Society ZOOM Guide.

Our YouTube channel is only used to house videos linked from our web site. The only video posted there this year was from the Halloween Party.

We began training the membership on Zoom in March and purchased a one-year Pro license for Zoom in April, which we have used for dozens of meetings to date. Unfortunately, not all of our members have the required home technology to use Zoom, and the pandemic made it difficult to acquire some of it.

The Retirees ListServ e-mail list has been used throughout the year for announcements and occasional recreational posts. The subscriptions to the list have increased by about twenty-five since we ceased physical meetings in March.

Other technology we use frequently at the Alumni Center includes a video camera, projector, and slide and photo scanners.

On the third Wednesday of the month, refreshments - with birthday cake the central feature - are provided by the Birthday Committee, comprised of Sharon Brown, Betty Bunce, and Joyce and Russ Hutchins.

On the other Wednesdays, refreshments are provided by volunteers from the Endacott membership.

Wednesday coffee refreshments are at times linked to specific events. On July 10, Judy Niebaum and Dave Marden provided treats from their wedding festivities. On January 22, Paul Lim provided themed treats to celebrate the Chinese Year of the Rat.

At the Wednesday coffee meetings on October 9 and again on May 20 (via Zoom), Heath Peterson, Alumni Association President, spoke to the membership about Alumni Association plans and decisions.
