At the same time, the Adams Alumni Center, our usual meeting space, will undergo a complete renovation. We do hope all the efforts invested pay off and the work proceeds according to plan. Many thanks to Jo Cink, our past president, for securing space at the Student Union where we can meet pending the completion of the renovation. As soon as we feel comfortable to start meeting in person again, we can begin reclaiming our normalcy while continuing to observe good safety precautions.

Heath Peterson, president of the Alumni Association, reports that they are making progress on fund raising for the remodel of the Alumni Center and still pursuing several significant gifts. He will have more to share with us later this summer.

Finally, my big hope is that our sojourn at the Union will be for a short time, and we will be back at our own space at the Alumni Center sooner than later. It will facilitate the possibility of having hybrid (physically present-ZOOM) meetings for our events. I have no doubt that we want to keep alive, and strong, the tradition of the Endacott Society, not only as a rich reservoir of knowledge, wisdom, and scholarship, but also its spirit of adventures in travels, current affairs, and new forms of knowledge. These are values we all hope will be invested in the new generation of Jayhawks.

PARKING options for Endacott events

in Kansas Union During our June 16 Wednesday Coffee, Margretta deVries from KU Transportation Services explained our parking options while we meet at the Union.

Our most attractive discounted retirees' options appear to be either the daily parking permits (\$1/dayfor those who only plan to attend events once a week or less or are not sure when or how often you will attend in person), or the annual retiree parking permit (\$110---for those who attend events at least twice a week year-round). Margretta received a copy of the most recent Endacott membership list to determine who is eligible for permits. A copy of the specifics of permits was sent to all members via our Endacott list serve. Annual Retiree parking permit - \$110

Allows parking in any parking lot or parking garage, excluding handicap spaces (unless you register your handicap placard with Transportation Services) year-round.

Daily parking permits - \$1/day.

Daily parking permits can be purchased in several ways. (See emailed information sheet for retirees.)

Annual Retiree PARK & RIDE parking permit – Free.

Allows parking at Park & Ride (lot 301) near 23rd & Iowa, with bus service that goes to Bailey Hall (<u>not</u> the Union).



Clearing the way for construction

Work to begin construction is underway for the new Jayhawk Welcome Center, scheduled to open in Fall 2022. Funded entirely through private gifts, the \$21 million, 30,000-square-foot structure will connect to the Adams Alumni Center. headquarters of the KU Alumni Association, at 1266 Oread Ave. As the new starting point for all campus visits by prospective students and their families, the Jayhawk Welcome Center will house approximately 20 members of the KU Admissions staff. The project also includes a separate, privately funded \$8 million renovation of the Adams Center, which opened in 1983. Fundraising for the Alumni Center renovation is ongoing. A timeline for the reopening of the Adams Alumni Center will be determined later this year and will be determined by the success and pace of identifying support.
