Alumni Center renovation to begin early 2022

uring the Oct. 20 coffee hour, Heath Peterson, KU Alumni Association president, said that renovation of the Adams Alumni Center will begin in early 2022. He expects the building to reopen next fall, when the adjoining Welcome Center plans to open.

The \$21-million Jayhawk Welcome Center is fully funded with private donations, and the \$8- to \$9-million renovation and technology upgrades for Adams Alumni Center, which opened originally in 1983, are well on their way to being fully funded. The renovation costs include \$5 million for technology upgrades and \$3 million for design upgrades.

The Welcome Center is on schedule to open in the Fall 2022 term. (See Page 8.)

The buildings are expected to provide a first-class experience for alumni and donors, prospective students and families, current students, faculty and staff, and retirees. The Welcome Center, which will house about 20 KU admissions staff, will be the starting point for campus visits by prospective students. The Alumni Center will manage the operation of both buildings. Alumni staff is training to use new management software for event operations as well as for safety and security.

Parking will be available in the Mississippi Street Parking Garage across from the Adams Alumni Center. Endacott members are being encouraged to purchase parking passes for that garage once the Alumni Center reopens.

Heath noted the combined projects will include such donor recognition opportunities as a website virtual donor wall, named spaces and signage in the alumni building, and a donor wall in the Welcome Center.

SEHP director to join Nov. 3 coffee hour to take questions about BCBSKS contract dispute with LMH

anet Stanek, director of the State Employee Health Program, will join our Zoom coffee hour at 10 a.m. Nov. 3 to take our questions regarding the impact on KU retirees' health coverage if Lawrence Memorial Hospital is no longer a network provider with Blue Cross Blue Shield of Kansas.

She would prefer to have questions in advance. Please send your questions to **Mary Jane Dunlap**, mjdunlap@ku.edu, to coordinate for Stanek.

In an Oct 21 memo emailed to state employees and retirees, Stanek said retirees who have a Medicare Supplemental plan through BCBSKS would not be affected. (See memo in right-hand column.)

The memo was primarily directed to current employees and announced an extension of their enrollment deadline from Oct 31 to Nov. 5 due to the stalled negotiation process.

The Oct. 25 Lawrence Journal-World reported the deadline extension, noting the impact on retirees in final paragraphs of the story:

"In general, state and university employees are at risk [of being out of network for LMH], along with people who work for a private employer who uses BCBS of Kansas. Also at risk are people who have purchased a BCBS of Kansas Medicare Advantage Plan, which is a type of insurance plan that is essentially an enhanced version of the federal Medicare insurance program.

"A different type of Medicare customer, however, is not currently at risk of getting knocked out of network. LMH has said customers with a BCBS of Kansas supplemental Medicare plan — often known as a Medigap Plan — are not impacted by these contract negotiations. The Medigap plan is under a different contract with LMH Health."

Dear SEHP Members and Benefits Eligible Employees,

Blue Cross and Blue Shield of Kansas (BCBSKS) is currently engaged in ongoing contract negotiations with Lawrence Memorial Hospital (LMH) to be included as a Network provider for 2022. Provider networks are developed by the vendor, in this case, BCBSKS. If an agreement cannot be reached, LMH would be a Non Network provider for BCBSKS members in 2022. As a Non Network provider, BCBSKS members would receive the Non Network benefit level for services and have higher Out of Pocket costs for non-emergency services received at LMH.

State Employee Health Plan staff are in contact with BCBSKS about this situation. BCBSKS sent out a communication regarding the contract negotiation with LMH to current members. While we are hopeful this matter will be rectified, it is unlikely this will happen before the 2022 Open Enrollment period ends.

To ensure SEHP members have an adequate opportunity to select a health plan they are confident in, Open Enrollment for Active Employees and COBRA members will be extended through Friday, November 5th. Current Direct Bill members will have until November 15th to make their 2022 elections. Members with a Medicare Supplement plan through BCBSKS will not be impacted by the contract issue.

As a reminder, the SEHP is contracted with both Blue Cross and Blue Shield of Kansas and Aetna to administer the health plans. Both plan networks are available for your review on the SEHP website https://

healthbenefitsprogram.ks.gov/sehp

We will keep you updated as we learn more about the status of the contract between Blue Cross and Blue Shield of Kansas and Lawrence Memorial Hospital.


New Public Affairs Forum chairs begin with homelessness panel
