KU retirees honored for service to Audio-Reader Network

hen Audio-Reader celebrated its 50th anniversary with a banquet Dec. 7, 2021, at Maceli's, several Endacott members were among 128 volunteers recognized for five or more of years of service.

Gayle Matchett and Sue Nishikawa topped the list. Gayle was honored for 35 years of service completed in 2020. Sue completed 30 years of service, also in 2020.

Rex Buchanan completed 25 years of service in 2020. Cindy Koester, JoAnne Kready, and Molly Mulloy have all been volunteering for 20 years — completed in 2021. Haskell Springer completed 20 years of service in 2020.

A posthumous award recognized the service of Eleanor Symons, who was Audio-Reader's first volunteer and who had continued volunteering after retiring from KU. She died Oct. 6, 2021, one month before completing her 50th year as a volunteer reader. **Goodwin "Goody" Garfield,** who died March 11, 2021, was recognized for his 10 years as a volunteer.

The Audio-Reader Network is a reading and information service for people who have difficulty reading standard print due to vision loss, physical or learning disability, mobility challenges, and age. Services are offered free of charge to anyone in the listening area who qualifies.

Dan Skinner, Audio-Reader director, noted: "This pandemic has emphasized just how essential and pertinent our service is. Our volunteers made sure our listeners had the news, information and connection to their communities they needed during this critical and isolating time. This is something our volunteers have been doing for a half-century, and because of them Audio-Reader will continue to serve our community for decades to come."

Linda Kehres, who became director of the Osher Lifelong Learning Institute at KU in 2019, will discuss how Osher has used technology to adapt to the pandemic while adding new courses and expanding KU's outreach to participants in more than 30 states. Osher was established at KU in 2004 and is one of 125 such institutes nationwide. The program provides intellectually engaging and enriching non-credit classes and events to diverse communities of lifelong learners, with a focus on participants age 50 and "better." Passing

Nella Larsen's short, 1929 novel, *Passing*, portrays a Black woman, Clare Kendry, who grew up in Chicago's Black community but who has spent her adult life "passing" as white; she is the wife of a wealthy and racist businessman. An accidental encounter with an old school friend, Irene Redfield, leads to a friendship that exposes both the complexities and the dangers of interracial relations in the 1920s. Passing is a picture of upper-middle-class urban Black life of the time and also a challenging exploration of issues of race, gender, and class that remain with us. Passing has received renewed attention with the 2021 film adaptation directed by Rebecca Hall and released through Netflix. The film is on TIME magazine's "10 Best Movies of 2021" list. The novel is published by Dover's Books of Interest series and is also available as an online pdf.

Dole Institute Spring 2022 programs offered both online and in person

The Robert J. Dole Institute of Politics plans to offer some Spring 2022 programs in person but will continue online programs.

Audrey Coleman, new director of the Dole Institute, said this semester's programs were inspired by the military service and U.S. Senate leadership of Bob Dole, who died Dec. 5, 2021.

"We're excited to gather online and, for the first spring since 2020, in person," she said. "We will continue to monitor conditions of the ongoing coronavirus pandemic, keeping the safety of our staff and our visitors in mind."

Evening programs begin Feb. 10 with the first installment in the virtual Presidential Lecture Series. The 2022 theme is "Military Veterans in the Oval Office." The series will consist of four virtual events in February and March featuring former Dole Institute Director Richard Norton Smith as well as leaders from the Truman and Eisenhower presidential libraries.

Endacott continues to seek donations to support Alumni Center projects

Endacott members have raised \$1,300 in support of the Alumni Association's dual projects to renovate the Adams Alumni Center and boost student recruitment with a new Jayhawk Welcome Center.

The Alumni Association and KU Endowment have raised all but \$2 million of the \$8 million to \$9 million needed to renovate the center for operation of the new Welcome Center and the building's traditional hospitality functions.

Construction of the privately funded \$21 million Welcome Center that adjoins the alumni building began last summer.
