Finds in the attic

We've occupied our new office in the Alumni Center for about six months now, and we have still not quite finished going through the boxes we had in storage for three years.

Upon unpacking we discovered a fascinating scrapbook kept by a student who was enrolled at KU from 1913 to 1917. His name was Ivan Huntsinger, and his scrapbook was donated to the KUAA by his son in 2008 with the hope that it could be preserved. It contains the sort of thing that you might expect from a student scrapbook: photos, playbills, ticket stubs, clippings, dance cards (!), and even pages for friends to make comments. One of the most unusual items inside is a German edition of the University of Kansas News Bulletin from 1915. On the front page there is a photograph of a group of serious looking people, one of whom is Alberta Corbin (as in Corbin Hall). Frank Baron was kind enough to translate from the German to reveal that this is a photo of the faculty of the KU German Department... all 14 of them! Judging from the amount of material he saved on the subject; Ivan was clearly a big KU football fan. He received an A.B. degree in 1917, saw action in France during WWI (awarded a Purple Heart and three Bronze Stars), and went on to a law career in South Dakota. The scrapbook is in a somewhat fragile condition, and we will be giving it to Spencer Research Library.

Posters were displayed during the anniversary dinner to commemorate our 40th year and the 100th year since Paul Endacott graduated from KU. We also have other plans for this poster, which will be central to one of our new service projects. Stay tuned for more information.

"Slumdog Millionaire" (Crime, Drama, Romance) (2008, 2 hours)

Born into extreme poverty, Jamal Malik, a humble 18-year-old tea merchant from the bustling Juhu slum of Mumbai, is only a few questions away from winning India's version of Who Wants to Be a Millionaire (1998). On the biggest night of his life, with millions of riveted viewers gripped with millionaire fever, Jamal is about to make the biggest gamble in TV history and walk away with a staggering 20 million rupees in his pocket. But as the quiz kid is on an unprecedented winning streak, a question arises. Is the plucky underdog, who has the answer to every question, a common swindler? Directed by Danny Boyle and Loveleen Tandan and written by Simon Beaufoy, the movie won eight Oscars and had 153 other wins and 133 nominations.

"Guess Who's Coming to Dinner" (Comedy, Drama) (1967, 1 hour 48 minutes) After Joanna Drayton (Houghton), a free-thinking white woman, and black doctor John Prentice (Poitier) return from a ten-day Hawaiian vacation, they return to Joanna's San Francisco home with her brand-new fiancé. Although he's a successful doctor, her parents Christina (Hepburn) and Mathew (Tracy), are taken aback when they discover that John is black. Matt Drayton and his wife are wealthy liberals who must confront the latent racism the coming marriage arouses. While John quickly wins over Christina with his charm and intelligence, Matthew is more hesitant. Also attending the Drayton's dinner are John's parents, who vehemently disapprove of the relationship. Directed by Stanley Kramer and Written by William Rose, the movie won two Oscars and had 11 other wins and 25 nominations.
