Once Upon a Time in the West (1968, 2h 46m)

A mysterious stranger joins with a notorious desperado to protect a beautiful widow, Mrs. McBain, from a ruthless assassin working for the railroad. She arrives from New Orleans to Utah to find her new husband and family slaughtered, but by whom? The prime suspect, Cheyenne, befriends her and offers to go after Frank, the killer assassin gang leader. He is accompanied by Harmonica, a man already on a quest to get even. Cast includes Henry Fonda, Charles Bronson, Jason Robards, and Claudia Cardinale. Directed by Sergio Leone and written by Leone and three others, the movie received 6 award wins and 5 nominations.

ZULU (Historic, War, Drama) 1964, 2h 18m

In 1879 Zululand, South Africa, the British are fighting the Zulus, and one of their columns has just been wiped out at Isandlwana. The Zulus next fix their sights on the small British outpost at Rorke's Drift. At the outpost are 150 British troops under the command of Lieutenants Bromhead and Chard. In the next few days, these 150 troops will fight about 4,000 Zulus in one of the most courageous battles in history.

Directed by Cy Endfield and written by John Prebble and Cy Endfield, this movie was the BAFTA nominee for Best British Art Direction (color).

DOCUMENTARY MOVIE

The Settlers (Documentary) 2016, 1h 47m

The first film of its kind to offer a comprehensive view of the Jewish settlers in the occupied territories of the West Bank. An historical overview, a geopolitical study and an intimate look at those people at the core of the most daunting challenges facing Israel and the international community today as the Palestinians and Israelis resume talks again. Directed by Shimon Dotan and written by him and Oron Adar the movie received 5 award nominations.
