The opera, first produced in 1880 and based on a Victor Hugo play, was his only major success but it succeeded beyond dreams and made him famous to this time. It is a difficult work to produce since it requires six major singers in all voice-types in demanding roles. "Gioconda" is a name in Italian which

ironically signifies a happy or self-satisfied woman (and "La Gioconda" is the name Italians give to the da Vinci painting we call the *Mona Lisa*). In this opera, though she is a generous woman she is anything but happy.

Our 2008 DVD video features a slim Deborah Voight as Gioconda with Ewa Podles, Richard Margison, Carlo Guelfi, Elisabetta Fiorillo, and Carlo Colombara. The lovely ballet *Dance of the Hours* is beautifully done. The production is of the Theatre del Liceu, Barcelona, and playing time is three hours.
