Opera Study will present a Metropolitan Opera production of what is probably the most popular, world-wide, of all Russian operas—Tchaikovsky's *Eugene Onegin*, which had its world premiere at the Little Theater in Moscow on March 29, 1879. It came to London in English in 1892, to La Scala in Milan, Italy in 1900, and to the Metropolitan Opera in New York in 1920, with Muzio, Martinelli, de Luca, and Didur.

Today the opera is part of the repertory of most of the world's great opera houses.

The performance that we will see and hear was filmed in 2007 with an excellent cast, including the famous soprano Renee Fleming as Tatiana, tenor Ramon Vargas as Lenski, baritone Dmitri Hvorostovsky as Eugene Onegin, and basso Sergei Aleksashkin as Prince Gremin, in addition to several other fine singers. The Metropolitan Opera's orchestra, chorus, and ballet are conducted by the Russian maestro Valery Gergiev.

We will hear two DVD recordings, the first for Act I and the second for Acts II and III. During the first intermission we will be served coffee, tea, and cookies. The music will take about two hours and thirty minutes. We should be finished around 4:30 or so.
