October 19—1:30 in the Paul Adam Lounge. The second bel canto opera this year is Bellini's I Puritani. Produced in 1835, it was the last opera of this composer who died so young at 33. It was a "sensational success." Having four of the leading singers in Europe made up for the inexperienced librettist. The opera requires coloratura singing by men as well as sopranos and is not performed often. Elvira is played by Slovak soprano Edita Gruberova who specialized in bel canto heroines and this role. The production by the Gran Teatre del Liceu in Barcelona was part of the Bellini bicentenary celebration in 2001. Arias from I Puritani in concerts by Joan Sutherland and Maria Callas helped revive bel canto operas.

In the English civil war of the 1640's after the death of Charles I the Puritans under Cromwell are about to defeat the Royalists. Puritan Elvira is ready to marry Royalist Arturo. When he disappears helping the widow of the king, Elvira loses her mind believing she has lost him. After an impressive mad scene Elvira recovers when Arturo returns. Cromwell's amnesty saves him from death and this melancholy opera ends in a wedding celebration.

The opera lasts two hours and forty minutes. Coffee, tea, cookies and conversation come after Act One.
