Thursday, June 20, 1:30 p.m. @ Adams Alumni Center

Leonard "Kris" Krishtalka, Director Emeritus, KU Biodiversity Institute, and Professor Emeritus of Ecology & Evolutionary Biology Kris will discuss and read from his 2024 novel, Native Blood, the fourth in his Harry Przewalski Mystery Series. The haunted and cerebral private detective is brought in to investigate the murder of a much-despised professor (in Spooner Hall!). The deeper Harry digs in his pursuit of justice, the more layers (and suspects) he unearths. Fans of noir fiction will enjoy the dark mood, the complex plot and the evocative language. Copies of Native Blood and the other Harry Przewalski novels will be available at the presentation (20% off for all four as a set), along with copies of Kris' The Body on the Bed, an historical fiction set in post-Civil War Lawrence.

DOMESTIC MOVIE

"IKE: Countdown to D-Day" (Drama, History, War) 2004 1hr 29min

A dramatization of the 90 days leading up to Operation Overload this is the story of the senior-level preparations for the D-Day invasion of Europe on June 6, 1944 from the time of Dwight D. Eisenhower's (Tom Selleck) appointment as the Supreme Allied Commander in Europe, to the establishment of the beachhead in Normandy. The film recounts many of the trials and tribulations lke had to face, not the least of which were the many prima donnas surrounded him (Patton, Montgomery and especially, de Gaulle) and the need for tact and diplomacy to bring all sides together for what would be the largest amphibious assault ever attempted. Ike brilliantly orchestrated the most important military maneuver in modern history. Directed by Robert Harmon and written by Lionel Chetwynd this TV movie was nominated for 6 Primetime Emmys with 10 nominations total.

FOREIGN MOVIE

"Amelie" (Comedy, Romance) 2001 2hr 2min

This movie is about a young French girl whose childhood was suppressed by her father's mistaken concerns about a heart defect. With little real-life contact with other people, Amelie resorts to her own fantasy world and dreams of love and beauty. Later as a young woman she moves to the central part of Paris and becomes a waitress. She finds a lost treasure in her apartment and returns it to the former occupant. Seeing his reaction, she decides to devote her life to helping people around her, including her father with his many personal problems while neglecting her own. Directed by Jean-Pierre Jeunet and written by Guilleaume Laurant and Jean-Pierre Jeunet this movie was nominated for 5 Oscars with 59 wins and 79 nominations total.

Basic Information

- Festival dates: September 18-22
- Transportation: Volunteer drivers
- **Tickets:** \$80 for one day, \$110-\$110 for two days, and \$125 for the entire festival. After September 13 ticket prices increase by about \$20.
- **Lodging:** There is not a hotel or motel that would accommodate even a small group, so attendees would need to make their own lodging arrangements. Winfield has very little motel space, and what there is tends to be snapped up months in advance. Ark City is 15 miles south of Winfield and may still have some rooms available as would Wellington, 23 miles southwest of Winfield. Closer to Wichita will no doubt have better availability, but that is a 40-50 mile trip.


