

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President's Report: David Mannering

I want to begin by extending my condolences to the family and friends of Paul Willhite, whose untimely death led to my assumption to the presidency this year.

2023 was the Endacott Society's 40th anniversary year, and we held a catered evening celebration in October (See the 40th Anniversary Celebration report below.). Members were encouraged to wear our 40th anniversary buttons at events throughout the year.

We attempted to enhance our status within the KU community via three new service projects:

In response to John Poggio's presentation of the results of the recent Retiree Survey, we launched a new program called Voices of Experience which aimed to provide some insights and guidance to prospective and new retirees on how to anticipate and navigate the social aspects of retirement. We held two panel discussions open to all faculty and staff, but almost no one attended. It still seems like it serves a good cause, but clearly needs to be redesigned if it is to be continued.

On Leap Day in February we co-sponsored the TGIT get together where the Endacott Society was formally recognized by KU Alumni Association president Heath Peterson.

In March we made a monetary donation to the KU Libraries Enhancement Fund in recognition of our benefactor Paul Endacott's use of the Engineering Library as a student.

These service projects were in addition to our annual February Food drive for the Campus Cupboard which garnered even more donations than previous years.

This was our first full year of operation under our MOU with KUAA, and we developed a formal budget for the first time in a few years to help us manage our new room rental and coffee catering expenses. The Treasurer's Report below will summarize the results.

Due to the restrictions of the MOU, we could not hold all our activities in the Alumni Center, so enterprising activity leaders found venues in the Senior Resource Center, the Lawrence Public Library, and the Pioneer Ridge Retirement Center. Two activities continued to be held via Zoom only. Most meetings at the Alumni Center were hybrid (in-person plus Zoom).

There are other items of interest for the year in the reports below, but I want to close this one by thanking the activity leaders, committee chairs, and officers for their contributions in keeping our organization healthy, dynamic, and fun. Also, best wishes to Kevin Boatright, our next president. The Endacott Society will be in good hands for the coming year.

Anticipated Income through the end of the fiscal year Expenses through June 5, 2024

In addition to the Phillips Petroleum Fund, the Expressions of Appreciation Fund, and the Oral History Fund (which is fully funded from the Grace Medes Fund), the Endacott Society has a new fund, the Retired Faculty Support Fund. This fund was set up June 1, 2023. The opening contribution to the fund was \$25,000 which was transferred from another Endowment fund by a retired faculty member. The expendable amount available each year is based on the interest earned through the KUEA investment spending policies.

The fund documents state: "This fund shall be used to support the activities of the Endacott Society whose membership includes retired faculty, staff, and their spouses, and their use of the Adams Alumni Center and the Jayhawk Welcome Center at the University of Kansas. Expenditures from the fund shall be made upon the recommendation of the President of the Kansas Alumni Association in consultation with officers of the Endacott Society."

Standing Committees:

Membership Report

- 1. Membership as of March 2023 was 383. As of June 2024 the membership was 387. Snapshots, however, are sometimes difficult to compare since annual memberships come due throughout the year for individuals. According to President Dave Mannering, we gained 10 new members during this year.
- 2. I obtained lists of retired faculty and staff from July 2022 thru June 2023. The list totaled 80 retirees.
 - a. Worked with the Alumni Association to cross check the retiree names for current Alumni Association membership and secondary cross check for Endacott Society membership.
 - b. Goals:
 - Those who are already Alumni Association members but not an Endacott Member will be encouraged to become active in Endacott.
 - Remaining retirees will be encouraged to join Alumni Association and become active in the Endacott Society, most likely at the reduced rate offered.
- 3. Recruitment of the 2022-23 retirees:
 - a. In July 2023, a letter from the Endacott Society (on KU Alumni Association letterhead) was sent to retirees who are current alumni members who are not active in Endacott. A similar letter was sent to those who are not current alumni members. Both explained our activities and included an Endacott Society brochure. Updated in 2022, this brochure also contains an application for membership.
 - b. An invitation for them to be guests at the upcoming August Evening Lecture and dinner was included in this letter. Three new retirees came to this dinner. None of these new retirees are on our current membership list
 - c. The email about the monthly newsletter (included month schedule of events) was sent to all new retirees for three months (September thru November).
 - d. Evaluate success of the process.
 - Nothing formal was evaluated during 2023-24.
 - **A future consideration**: Consider re-contacting those who have been retired one year or longer to inquire about their interest in joining Endacott.
 - It has been suggested that we list the latest retirees in a fall newsletter.
- 4. Membership recruitment is an ongoing project. Working with Austin Harris of the KU Alumni Association is delightful. He is extremely helpful in our recruitment process.

During the past year, four KU-related speakers made presentations, starting in August 2023 and concluding in June 2024. For the first time since 2020, all of the presentations took place in person at the Adams Alumni Center. Here's a summary of the 2023-24 programs.

August 10: Dennis Domer, Professor Emeritus of American Studies, and others involved in the project, discussed Embattled Lawrence: The Enduring Struggle for Freedom.

November 15: Val Stella, University Distinguished Professor Emeritus of Pharmaceutical Chemistry, is an internationally acclaimed researcher, inventor and entrepreneur in the field of drug discovery and delivery. His topic was "Is there a difference between inventing in Science and being creative in the Humanities?"

March 28: Carol Smith, Dean of Libraries, discussed KU Libraries' new five-year set of strategic priorities, as well as the future of libraries as tools for teaching, learning and research.

June 20: Leonard "Kris" Krishtalka, Director Emeritus of the KU Biodiversity Institute and Professor Emeritus of Ecology & Evolutionary Biology, discussed and read from his 2024 novel, Native Blood, the fourth in his Harry Przewalski Mystery Series.

Library Report

Endacott's Big Move to new quarters in the renovated Adams Alumni Center in March of 2023 involved figuring out what to do with all the books from the old library, which had been in storage in various locations throughout the period of renovation. Highest priority was given to accessible shelving of the oral histories. The new Endacott office had built-in shelves lining the east wall, which were very largely filled up with oral histories. Belated but grateful thanks to a number of Endacotters who were involved in moving books to our new office, most of which had to be stored initially in our large storage cabinets in the hallway next to the office. Led by Dave Mannering, we "downsized" the number of books considerably, distributing those we decided not to keep in a variety of ways. Dave also secured two additional bookcases for the south wall to enable us to house most of the remaining books.

In the late summer of 2023 we organized them by categories and alphabetized them by author. Categories include Kansas history, KU history, nature and gardening in Kansas, and the arts in Kansas. Oral History Project

We are gaining momentum and look forward to reporting even more progress next year.

Special Event: Endacott Society 40th Anniversary Celebration
