
The Namesake (2006) (Drama, Indie film) Hulu, 2hrs 2min.

The Namesake, directed by Mira Nair, is a vibrant, deeply felt drama that follows Gogol Ganguli—played with surprising intensity by Kal Penn—as he tries to outrun the name and heritage he never asked for. Torn between his Indian parents' traditions and the American life he's desperate to claim, Gogol's journey becomes a powerful collision of identity, love, loss, and belonging. Their son, Gogol, born in America, struggles with his cultural identity shaped by his name.

The play, described as "a satire on American family life, concerns a married couple and their elderly mother. On a particular day, they are visited by two guests who turn their worlds upside down." One critic wrote "Albee explores the hollowness of the American dream, as well as the fallacy of the ideal American family."
