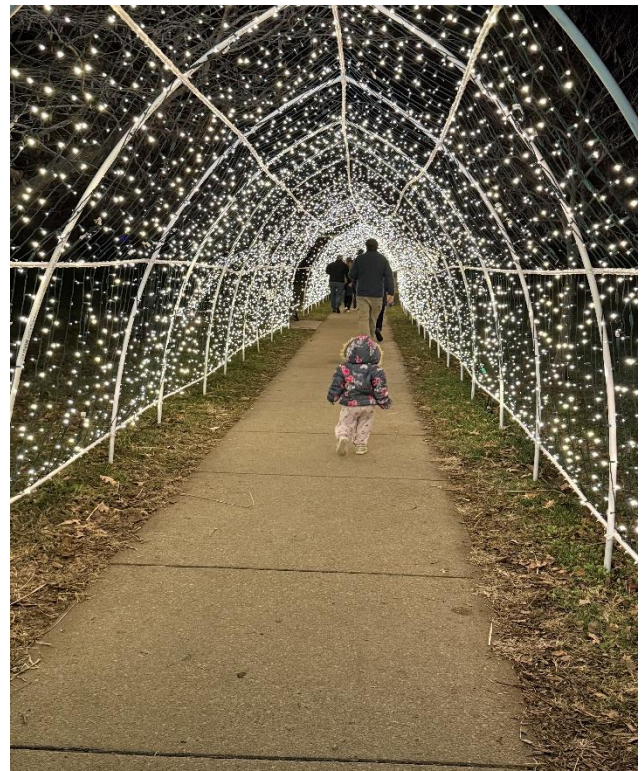

DOMESTIC MOVIE

Happy Feet (Animal Adventure, Computer Animation) 2006, 1hr 48min

Happy Feet is an animated musical comedy set in Antarctica that follows Mumble, an emperor penguin who can't sing—the one talent his community values most—but discovers he has an extraordinary gift for tap dancing.

Using the voice of Elijah Wood, Mumble's dancing sets him apart and eventually turns him into an unlikely hero. As he journeys beyond his colony, the film blends humor, pop songs, and energetic dance numbers with a surprisingly serious environmental message about overfishing and human impact on nature.

Directed by George Miller (*Mad Max*), *Happy Feet* is known for its cutting-edge animation and eclectic soundtrack, which mixes classic tunes with contemporary hits. The film won the Academy Award for Best Animated Feature and appeals to kids with its colorful spectacle while offering adults themes of individuality, belonging, and ecological responsibility.

Trans-Siberian (Thriller, Crime, Mystery) 2008, 1hr 51min

Trans-Siberian is a tense, slow-burn thriller set largely aboard the famed Trans-Siberian Railway. The film follows Roy and Jessie, an American couple traveling home from China, who befriend two fellow passengers—an encounter that draws them into a dangerous web of drug smuggling, deception, and violence.

Directed by Brad Anderson (*The Machinist*), the movie thrives on mounting paranoia and moral ambiguity rather than action. Emily Mortimer gives a standout performance as Jessie, whose curiosity and compassion pull her deeper into trouble, while Woody Harrelson plays a hard-edged Russian detective whose motives remain unsettlingly unclear.

Shot on location in China and Russia, *Trans-Siberian* uses its wintry landscapes and claustrophobic train compartments to create a gripping atmosphere of isolation and mistrust. It's a smart, unsettling thriller that rewards patience, gradually tightening its grip as loyalties fracture and secrets surface.

Shackleton (Adventure, History, Documentary) 2002, 1hr 30min

Shackleton (2002) is a gripping historical drama about Sir Ernest Shackleton's legendary Antarctic expedition and one of the greatest survival stories ever recorded.

Starring Kenneth Branagh in an acclaimed, Golden Globe-winning performance, the film recounts the doomed 1914 Endurance expedition, when Shackleton and his crew became trapped in pack ice and were forced to abandon their ship. What follows is a harrowing ordeal of endurance, leadership, and sheer will as Shackleton struggles to keep all his men alive against impossible odds.

Rather than focusing on conquest, *Shackleton* emphasizes moral courage and responsibility, portraying its subject as a leader defined not by reaching the South Pole, but by his refusal to sacrifice a single life. Shot in stark, icy landscapes, the film balances historical detail with emotional intensity, making it both an adventure epic and a study of leadership under extreme pressure.

The "Letter from Birmingham Jail" has become an American classic: a passionate affirmation of freedom and equality that stands squarely in the Western political, philosophical, and religious traditions and draws on the wisdom of a striking variety of sources past and present from that tradition. It's also an introduction to nonviolent resistance and a call to social justice that remains timely. Interestingly, the "letter" is just that—a public letter to a group of clergies, not one of MLK's memorable sermons and addresses.

"Letter from Birmingham Jail" (1963) is available in the Penguin Modern series of paperbacks at a very low price. It's also available in volumes of King's collected writings, and online in a pdf file. It's not long, but it's a very rich text that bears close examination.
