Val Stella, a Distinguished Professor Emeritus of Pharmaceutical Chemistry, is a world-renowned authority on drug discovery, development and delivery. He holds 59 U.S. patents and is the inventor or co-inventor of seven drugs that are currently on the market. Much of his work focuses on how to make a drug work more effectively. In these two consecutive sessions, he will help participants understand how their medications work and how they are administered and dosed. He will respond to such questions as "Why do I have to take some of my medications with food?" and "How might my medication dose need to be adjusted as I age?"

Shackleton (Adventure, History, Documentary) 2002, 1hr 30min is a gripping historical drama about Sir Ernest Shackleton's legendary Antarctic expedition and one of the greatest survival stories ever recorded. Starring Kenneth Branagh in an acclaimed, Golden Globe-winning performance, the film recounts the doomed 1914 Endurance expedition, when Shackleton and his crew became trapped in pack ice and were forced to abandon their ship. What follows is a harrowing ordeal of endurance, leadership, and sheer will as Shackleton struggles to keep all his men alive against impossible odds. Rather than focusing on conquest, Shackleton emphasizes moral courage and responsibility, portraying its subject as a leader defined not by reaching the South Pole, but by his refusal to sacrifice a single life. Shot in stark, icy landscapes, the film balances historical detail with emotional intensity, making it both an adventure epic and a study of leadership under extreme pressure.

Norwegian playwright Henrik Ibsen (1828-1906) is often regarded as “the father of modern drama.” He is the most frequently performed dramatist in the world, after Shakespeare, and was a pioneer of theatrical realism. His plays addressed difficult subjects in ways that were scandalous to Victorian Era audiences. In February we will read *Hedda Gabler* (1891), whose manipulative lead role is considered one of the greatest for women actors. A newlywed trapped in a loveless marriage to a university professor (!), she struggles with an unexciting existence. The play features alcoholism, adultery and suicide as plot elements – an incendiary mix with tragic results.

Our author will be Alice Walker and our readings will be eight of her short stories from her first collection, *In Love & Trouble* (Harper One, 1973). Walker was both a writer and a civil rights activist from the South during and following Martin Luther King's years of leadership, and I thought these stories might be illuminating as fictional portraits of Southern Black women's lives from that era.

Alice Walker (1944) is a distinguished contemporary American author of seventeen novels and short story collections, seven volumes of poetry, five books of nonfiction essays, and three children's stories. For her best-known novel *The Color Purple* (1982), she was awarded both a Pulitzer Prize and a National Book Award. The 1985 film adaptation was directed by Steven Spielberg. A prominent feminist activist, Walker was an editor of *Ms.* magazine. She played an important role in the revival of interest in Zora Neale Hurston, and it was Walker (together with writer Charlotte Hunt) who in 1973 designated an unmarked grave in the Fort Pierce, Florida cemetery as Hurston's. (Walker had a permanent gravestone made for it and wrote the inscription.) One of our stories, "The Revenge of Hannah Kemhuff," was written "in grateful memory of Zora Neale Hurston."
