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## **President's Report:**

As I look back on the past year, I am amazed at how quickly the time has passed. In the beginning I was concerned that we needed to add programs and activities to engage our membership. I still believe that we need to find new ways and activities to engage more of our membership more actively. However, most of the time I was more concerned with finding time and space for the many activities which were going on! One simply has to look back at our newsletters to see all the events and activities going on within the organization.

Most of all I am grateful and thankful to the many people who make this organization an active and living group. Most visible are the weekly activity chairs, Dave Mannering for Tech Studies and Cal Cink for the Garden Seminar organizing activities bi-weekly for 9 months of the year. Then there are the many other groups who do not regularly meet at the Alumni Center: Drama, Cinema studies, the Book Group, Games theory, Old Time Radio, the lunch bunch and Tai Chi. We have had Arts & Sciences lectures, Armchair Travels, Potluck dinners and out of town travel experiences. Linda Mullens wears several hats: Treasurer, Membership, and Potluck dinners. Then there are all the other forms of support: Dave Mannering with tech support, Jim Woelful and the Library, Jo Cink with Care Correspondence, Cal & Jo coordinating our collection of food each February for the Campus Cupboard. Laurie Doud effectively pulls together the newsletter each month, aided by Audrey Kamb-Studdard. Thanks as always to Derek Kwan and the Lied Center staff for providing tickets to our group for a performance each year at the Lied Center. This year we had over fifty people attend the concert by Aristo Sham, the Van Cliburn Gold Medal winning pianist.

But I would like to highlight another group of people who are less visible to the full membership: the volunteers who bring the treats to the Wednesday coffee each week, Cal & Jo Cink for bringing cake the third Wednesday each month, and the many folks who set up for the coffee hour and just as important, clean up afterwards. This isn't a named group with a "chair", but a small army of folks who make sure everything functions smoothly each week for the group. That we have napkins, creamer, tea, plates & forks and everything to make the coffee hour operate smoothly. Thank you for all that you do!

This year has also been a year of change in our relationship to the KU Alumni Association, now known as KU Alumni. In July 2025 the Alumni Association ended its model of paid annual dues for membership in KU Alumni. Since the Endacott Society operates as an affiliate group of KU Alumni, historically membership (paid) was a condition of membership in the Endacott Society. By eliminating membership dues for the Association, membership in the Endacott Society now simply requires retirement from KU, its affiliated corporations, or another university. I think that over time, as we communicate this more widely, this will help us increase membership. It does require some changes to our Bylaws to recognize that Alumni membership is no longer a requirement for Endacott membership. We are also taking the opportunity to clean up some other out of date language in the Bylaws. The recommended changes were sent out via email to the membership. We will need to vote at the Annual Meeting to amend the Bylaws.

As I close my remarks, I need to offer my special thanks to Dave Mannering. Dave has been a long time (40+years) friend and running partner and he got me involved in the Endacott Society. He has been a source of great support and a sounding board throughout this past year. I am looking

forward to stepping back somewhat and hope to offer Gary Minden any help I can as he takes over the role of President. Thank you all for a good year!

## Standing Committees:

### Membership Report

May 31, 2026

1. Membership as of June 2025 was 389. As of May 2026, the membership was 323. Snapshots, however, are sometimes difficult to compare since annual memberships come due throughout the year for individuals. According to the Alumni Association, we gained 11 new members during this academic year.
2. I obtained lists of retired faculty and staff from July 2024 thru June 2025. The list totaled 103 retirees. The process to obtain this list was modified. I no longer contact KU Human Resources directly. The request now must be made through the KU Provost's Office.
3. As in prior years, the Endacott group suggested that we also 're-recruit' those who retired in 2024 (106 retirees). There was a tremendous transition in membership recruitment within the Alumni Association. They had changed to remove membership dues, and thus the removal of membership dues for the Endacott Society. Contact with recent retirees did not occur until December 2025.
  - a. Worked with the Alumni Association to create letters to the recent retirees and also the 2024 retirees.
  - b. On December 10, 2025 a letter was sent to these two groups of retirees inviting them to be guests at the upcoming January Evening Lecture and Dinner. Five new retirees attend the January 2026 dinner.
  - c. Evaluate success of the process.
    - As suggested in prior years, we re-contacted those who have been retired one year or longer to inquire about their interest in joining Endacott.
    - It has been suggested that we list the latest retirees in a fall newsletter. This was not done.
    - The Brochure was not updated and was not included in the membership letter. It needs to be updated and reprinted prior to 2026 recruitment activities.
4. Membership recruitment is an ongoing project. Working with Hala Hamid of the KU Alumni Association is delightful. Due to reorganization within the Alumni Association, I do not think she will be the person I will work with in the future.

### Nominating Committee 2026-2027

The bylaws state that "The immediate Past President shall serve as Chair of the Nominating Committee and shall by February 1 appoint a minimum of two additional members to this Committee, which shall meet to prepare a slate of officers to be presented at the Annual Meeting." The bylaws also state that "The President-Elect [i.e., Gary Minden] shall succeed to the Presidency the following year without election." All officers begin their terms on July 1.

As Past President, I asked Linda Mullens, Betty Bunce and Mary Jane Dunlap to assist me in this assignment. In the Endacott newsletter, in emails to the Retirees list, and in announcements at the weekly Endacott coffee meeting, I invited suggestions for officers and encouraged all interested persons to contact me if they wished to be considered for election. I did not receive any suggestions or volunteers, though Linda and Betty expressed their willingness to continue as Treasurer and Secretary, respectively.

The Nominating Committee met and discussed a number of good options for the position of President-Elect. It is worth noting that, as of July 1, there will be 10 former Presidents or Co-Presidents active in Endacott. Put another way, at any given Wednesday morning coffee meeting

about a third of the participants are former Presidents. It's good to have that much experience and corporate memory in the room! They are among our most engaged members, but Presidents serve for one year – and are ineligible to succeed themselves in office. In a sense, we have a somewhat limited pool to choose from – though, with payment of KU Alumni dues no longer a requirement for membership, anyone who meets the eligibility criteria could be nominated and serve as an officer if elected.

(The bylaws don't disbar a former President from serving again later, but in Endacott's 43 years it's only happened once: when Dave Mannering stepped forward in 2023 at the sudden passing of President-Elect Paul Willhite.)

## **Student Ambassadors**

**ACTIVITY's PURPOSE: "To facilitate meaningful dialogue within students' 'life cycles' and encourage interaction and sharing with members of our society and their individual unique careers."**

The Mini Golf Group was initiated last year at the Senior Resource Center (SRC). It ended with the expansion of activities at the practice greens of Orchards Golf Course on Bob Billings Pkwy and Eagle Bend Golf Course east of Clinton Lake. I learned that golf was an excellent tool to use to meet students that were having difficulties. I demonstrated simple golf tips that were easy to use and opened a dialog with them to share backgrounds and goals.

I visited Eagle Bend and Orchards practice greens a total of 140 times last year looking for golfers with problems. On 87 of those visits I was able to open conversations with over 220 individuals. Each of those visits I talked to groups of one to four persons that lasted 15 to 45 minutes. On the other visits I just practiced my game to sharpen my skills.

On one occasion I was invited to describe the game of golf and the use of the putter to a group of high school students. Their teacher taught a course on recreation and healthful living. He took the classes to different recreational locations. That particular day was "golf day" and they came to Orchards Golf Course. They came in 4 buses, 40 students at a time and I thought afterward, "Be careful what you wish for.!" I had just 10 minutes with each group before they separated into small groups to practice.
